

INTERNATIONAL RELIGIOUS FREEDOM ADVOCACY FELLOWSHIP

International Christian Concern (ICC), is a Washington DC area non-profit, non-partisan, and non-denominational organization devoted to providing assistance, advocacy, and awareness for persecuted Christians worldwide. The advocacy department has a proven record of advocating on behalf of persecuted Christians and religious minorities and seeks a talented individual to continue these efforts.

The ICC International Religious Freedom Advocacy Fellowship offers applicants a unique opportunity to gain professional experience in international affairs, human rights, and international religious freedom while interfacing with Congressional leaders, administration staff, and like-minded NGOs to advocate for religious freedom for Christians and other religious minorities around the world.

The Fellowship is based at ICC's headquarters in the Washington DC area and will involve regular meetings on Capitol Hill and with other government agencies. Although not guaranteed, Fellows who successfully complete six-months at ICC's headquarters may be placed full-time with a Congressional office for a six-month period to continue working on issues related to international religious freedom and human rights.

This Fellowship is open to recent graduates and professionals with a background in law, public policy, international relations, advocacy, human rights, or journalism who have obtained at least an undergraduate degree and are looking to expand their depth of knowledge and practical skill sets in the advocacy discipline.

Fellowship Description

- Full-time.
- Six-months minimum, for placement with Congressional office, one-year minimum
- Stipend: \$2,500.00
- Application Deadline: Rolling (Fellowship start dates are typically in January and July, though exceptions may be made on a case-by-case basis)
- Qualifications and requirements:
 - Bachelor's Degree in International Affairs/Relations, Public Policy, Political Science, Government or Related Field.
 - Graduate Students and Degree Holders Preferred
 - Minimum 3.0 Undergraduate GPA
 - Resume
 - Writing sample
 - Official letter of recommendation from current or previous academic advisor, dean, or former employer
 - Contact information for 3 references (including one faith-based reference)

Fellowship Components

Mentorship: All fellows are assigned a staff mentor. Mentors work closely with fellows in personal and professional development, meeting regularly to answer questions, provide meaningful projects, offer career advice, and assist fellows in getting the most out of the program.

Other Work Activities include, but are not limited to:

- Projects structured around the fellow's skills and abilities.
- Various tasks relating to the operations of a non-profit organization.
- Research projects to further the goals of the advocacy team
- Advocacy events such as advocacy campaigns on Capitol Hill, meetings with State Department, public demonstrations, writing opinion editorials, etc., depending on availability.
